New Finance Arrangements

We are excited to announce our school will be transitioning to an upgraded School Bytes finance system on 23 May 2023!

In preparation for the transition to a simplified finance system for both you and the school, we will be required to implement a short payment lockout period where we will not be able to receive any payments.

What this means for you

- No payments can be made online from 9am, Tuesday 16th May 2023.
- Last day to make cash, cheque or EFTPOS payments will be close of business on Tuesday 16th May 2023.
- We will advise you when payments can resume closer to the above date
- Any existing payment links that have been sent to you previously in emails can still be used after the transition and will automatically redirect to the new system
- After the transition, a School Bytes portal will be available for you to register and begin using (Link: https://portal.schoolbytes.education)
- All previous payments made will be migrated to the new School Bytes finance system and portal

What is the School Bytes portal

The School Bytes portal provides flexibility for you to conveniently:

- Make school payments online (including paying for multiple siblings at once)
- Use a family credit to pay for an activity or school contributions
- Download a receipt for payments made
- · View all historical payments in one place
- Complete and submit digital permission notes
- View the status of all permission notes
- Request a refund if required

This can be done where you want at any time: day or night.

Through the portal, you will easily be able to download a receipt once a payment has been made and have access to view all historical payments when needed. Online payments are processed in real-time and can be viewed by school staff immediately.

While our preference is for payments to be made via the portal, we will still accept payment via cash, cheque, money order and EFTPOS.

Opening Hours:

Services for students:

Printing Reminder

All students are able to print both colour and black and white A4 pages. Printing costs 10c black and white/page and 30c colour/page. You need to swipe your school ID card and insert coins next to the photocopier or see the library staff to add funds into your school account.

If you have difficulties printing from the computer, please ask the staff for assistance.



Write a Book in a Day will be happening again this year. RGHS library will be the venue for the competition. The project involves two teams of up to 10 students, one from Years 7-9, and the other from Years 10-11 writing a book within a 12-hour time frame, from 8am to 8pm. The book will be published on the Write a Book in a Day website. The funds raised through the competition go toward childhood cancer research to

Each year RGHS participates in the Premier's Reading Challenge. To achieve the challenge, students simply read 20 books up until **18 August**. At least 10 of the books must be chosen from the Premier's Reading Challenge list. Students who complete the challenge will receive a certificate signed by the NSW Premier. Students who participate for multiple years will receive Gold or Platinum certificates. Students who have completed the challenge every year from Year 3 to Year 9 will receive the Premier's Reading Challenge Medal. RGHS encourages all students to complete the challenge.

Stage 4

Timber in Stage 4 Technology Mandatory







Year seven technology mandatory students have been working on their Store-it practical projects in the second half of term one. The girls have been learning and improving their timber preparation skills of marking out, sawing and preparing timber items for assembly. Students have gained an appreciation of measurement and accuracy when using hand tools and machines like the Disc Sander. An element of difficulty was the fitting of a captive plywood base into grooves machined on the inside of the box. For the majority of the girls the highlight has been using the Pyro-pen to decorate their boxes with text and graphics. The response and feedback from the students has been very positive.

Year 9 Design and Technology







Year 9 Design & Technology students have been busy developing ideas and prototypes for their 'Bling!' design project. Students investigated a culture of their choice and have designed a 3 piece jewellery collection for an identified end user. Students have been integrating a range of tools, materials and processes from Adobe Illustrator, the laser cutter, 3D printers, resin, fimo and even making their own materials from up-cycled bottle caps! We can't wait to see them!

Year 10 Food Technology

Year 10 Food Technology have recently completed their first major practical Assessment Task in which they had to construct a celebratory cake for a special occasion. This task has taken the past 10 weeks to plan with the cakes being made in stages. The planning and hard work was well worth it, considering the quality of the final products. ArtExpress showcases the work of some of the state's best young talent and this year disruption is a key theme. Margaret Rice reports

ope dances with loss in local artworks selected for exhibition at the Art Gallery of NSW's ArtExpress this year. And hope ascends.

ArtExpress is the yearly exhibition at the Art Gallery of NSW of outstanding work submitted by final-year students for their HSC examinations the previous year, in this case 2022.

"ArtExpress is one of our most popular exhibitions and has been displayed at the art gallery since 1983, so we're celebrating our 40th year," says Louise Halpin, curator of ArtExpress 2023.

"Even though we may have seen themes expressed previously, what is always interesting is the students' individual and often passionate response to these concepts.

"As the principal venue, it's important to exhibit the creativity, diversity and complex investigations by students of the world and the time in which they live."

Two students from the eastern suburbs achieved the high point of being exhibited this year, Rosina Antico of Kambala and Sunny Pather of Randwick Girls' High School

In her traditional-style oil painting, Rosina has depicted trays of delicious, vibrant fruits. But as the eye moves from one to the next, you realise abundance is giving way to scarcity, the fullness of one tray yielding to the emptiness of another.

Beautiful and lush – the cherry image looks almost photo-like. But there is a sinister statement about the state of our world lurking in Rosina's work.

In Rosina's description, she says her work "explores the disruption of our food sources throughout the past three years, affected by natural disasters".

The disruption theme continues in the work of Sunny, who, in her collection of small paintings, depicted faces looking out of windows, a work that grew out of the isolation of the pandemic. You feel as though the people depicted are hidden behind walls, waiting to

break free, blocked from engaging directly with life.

Sunny explains her idea began with exploring balconies and changed as she found herself expressing through her art the experience of the Covid pandemic she had just lived through, and the stresses related to this, including for the community grappling with lockdowns.

The isolation in the images is something Sunny says she saw only clearly afterwards.

As the work evolved, it was inspired by the meshing of Italianstyle balconies with the realities of an Australian suburban lockdown.

But Sunny says the Covid measure wasn't all bad. In her own community, which influences the work, out of lockdown neighbourliness grew.

"I'm really fortunate because I live near the beach at Maroubra, so I could see the water," she says,

"And we were meant to stay in

our own homes but that ended up being really social because in our apartments neighbours who didn't know each other before reached out to each other.

"Strangers turned into really close friends as people really grew to trust their neighbours."

Sunny's community became, and still is, really close-knit, as a result of those pandemic lock-downs. So optimism triumphed over pessimism, even though the pandemic took up so much of her nearly adult life, she explains.

This year Sunny is making jewellery, which she hopes to sell through local markets and online. She is also heading to Europe.

"I have never been overseas before and I'm really excited about it. The places that inspired my art, like Spain and Italy, I will see in real life," she says.

The ArtExpress exhibition, in the Art Gallery of NSW's historic South Building, runs until May 7



Re: School Opal Card Compliance

Dear Parent/Guardian,

As your local school bus operator, we wanted to start Term 2 with a warm welcome and to reaffirm our commitment to working with you throughout the year to provide a safe, reliable and efficient service for your school community.

One of our key focus areas this year is to improve Opal compliance among school students, and we need your help to achieve this.

In Term 1, we visited a number of schools to monitor boarding and encourage correct Opal card usage.

We found that the common reasons students do not tap on are:

- They do not hold an Opal card as they have either not applied for it or have not replaced it after it has expired or been lost,
- They have forgotten to bring their Opal card with them,
- They have a valid card, but do not believe it is a requirement to Tap On and Off,
- The driver does not enforce it/ask them to TAP ON,
- There are insufficient funds on their Child/Youth Opal card.

Why do students need to Tap On and Off with their Opal Card?

It is essential for all school students to travel with a valid School Opal Card or Child/Youth Opal Card.

This is so that we can understand customer travel patterns and can adjust the services provided, if necessary.

Every time a student Taps On and Off, students are counted on our service – when students do not, they are invisible. Without accurate patronage data, Transport for NSW has the option to withdraw services that show low patronage.

Further, adopting the behaviors of Tapping On and Off is a key part of fare compliance.

Once students are no longer travelling to and from school, it is a legal requirement to travel with a valid ticket.

Embedding these behaviors from an early age minimizes chances of adopting non-compliant behaviors later in life.

What can parents and guardians do to help?

We ask that all parents ensure that their children have a valid Opal card for travelling to and from school each day. We also ask that you please encourage them to Tap On and Off every time they use a bus service.

To be eligible for a School Opal Card the student must:

- be a resident of NSW, or an overseas student eligible for free government education.
- be aged 4 years 6 months or older. Pre-school children are not eligible.
- live a minimum distance from your school:
 - Years K-2 (Infants) No minimum distance.
 - Years 3-6 (Primary) 1.6km straight line distance or 2.3km walking or further.
 - Years 7-12 (Secondary) 2km straight line distance or 2.9km walking or further.

If you do not meet these criteria, your child will need to carry a Child/Youth Opal card with funds loaded onto it.

What are we doing to help?

We are working closely with schools to improve Opal compliance and encourage students to Tap On and Off every time.

We found that with onsite assistance from our on-the-ground ambassador team, we are able to significantly improve the number of students tapping on. We assisted drivers and teachers by asking students to line up with their Opal cards ready and gave priority boarding to those with a valid card. Those without were reminded to have a valid Opal card for their next journey. Our drivers are also expected to ask students to TAP ON when they board.

We are also working with Transport for NSW to improve the messaging across the network to communicate that it is a requirement for school students to Tap On and Off with a valid Opal Card.

While we can provide adhoc support upon request, we rely upon your assistance to help us manage Opal compliance. We appreciate any assistance that you can provide.

We hope to work together with you to reduce the number of non-compliant students – as continuous low Tap On and Off data means that our services appear underutilised and are at risk of being modified, reduced, withdrawn or redirected to parts of the network that show a higher demand.
